Six Flags Great Adventure features the world's largest drive-thru Safari outside of Africa, home to a **brand new exhibit of four beautiful, rare, white Bengal tigers!** Guests can drive their own vehicle or take a tour bus through the Safari.

Where is it?

Six Flags Great Adventure Safari is located adjacent to Six Flags Great Adventure in Jackson, NJ, approximately one hour from both Philadelphia and New York City. Take the NJ Turnpike, exit 7A or the Garden State Parkway, exit 98 to Interstate 195, exit 16.

When is it open?

Open daily May 11 through Sept. 11, plus Saturdays and Sundays from Oct. 7 through 30 and Columbus Day, Oct. 10. The Safari opens daily at 9 a.m. Closing times vary.

How many animals live in the Safari?

Nearly 1,200 animals, representing 55 species from six continents, roam the park freely. Safari residents include elephants, rhinos, kangaroos, monkeys, giraffes, bison, ostriches, lions and tigers.

How large is the Safari?

The 350-acre wildlife preserve offers a glimpse of wild animals in their natural habitats, simulating exotic areas of the world. The Safari stretches 4.5 miles and features 10 themed sections, including the African Plains and Australian Section.

Where do the animals go in the winter?

Who takes care of the animals?

During the off-season, the 1,200 exotic animals stay at the Safari in the natural habitats designed for them. As temperatures get colder in the winter months, the animals can stay in heated housing facilities for their comfort.

How much food do the animals eat each year?

During full park operation, the Safari employs more than 70 workers to help care for the animals. During the winter months, 21 workers remain on staff. The highly skilled Safari staff includes a veterinarian specializing in exotic animal care and a specially trained veterinarian technician.

The Safari serves up over 935 tons of grain, food and hay annually.

Can I feed the animals?

No. For the safety of our Guests and our animals, we ask that Guests refrain from feeding anything to the animals. Remember, although many of our Safari friends appear tame, they are wild animals and may bite, peck or scratch. In addition, the animals have daily feeding schedules and receive special vitamins and minerals as needed, to ensure a nutritious, balanced diet.
