
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Canvonlands National Park.

Utah Go four-wheel driving in the Mineral Bottom Recreation Site for remarkable canyon views and winding steep switchbacks or bring your kayak for paddling in the Green River. Fancy activities like canyoneering, rappelling, hot air balloon rides or tandem base jumping? They've got those too.



Canaveral National Seashore, Florida Fly-fish in Mosquito Lagoon, meander along Black Point Wildlife Drive for loggerhead sea turtle and manatee sightings or take hiking trails out to the 50-foot Turtle Mound, a shell midden made up of 1.5 million bushels of oyster shells.

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Craters of the Moon **National Monument** and Preserve, Idaho

Created by volcanic eruption as recently as 2,000 years ago, this internationally designated Dark Sky Park (meaning its starry nights are exceptional) rests on lava fields and boasts 360degree stargazing views. Climb up cinder cones, explore underground caves (also known as lava tubes) or peek inside mini volcanoes.



Kenai Fjords National Park, Alaska Hop aboard a boat tour and traverse the fjords and waterways to spot humpback whales, sea otters, puffins and peregrine falcons. Because ice covers more than half of this park (including Harding Icefield, home to 38 towering glaciers), ice climbing and dog sledding are available.

Hiawatha National Forest, Michigan

This Upper Peninsula spot delivers wildlife. lakes, beaches, waterfalls and the Point Iroquois Lighthouse, which towers above Lake Superior. Walk the two-mile Au Train Sonabird Trail to hear a woodland concert of chickadees and nuthatches and be sure to stop for the breathtaking overlooks of Grand Island and the cascading Laughing Whitefish Falls.
